CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

2021 saw TCBA continue to navigate the challenges of operating in a COVID - 19 environment. As an Executive, we are particularly proud of the way that staff and volunteers continued to pull together to ensure that we delivered as much basketball as possible within our community.

COVID resulted in a number of disruptions, and unfortunately also the cancellation of a number of representative tournaments and events. We were able to continue running a number of events, but without spectators due to Government restrictions. Whilst we are still living through the pandemic, we are looking forward to what will hopefully be a more normal year in 2022 in that regard, and to seeing our players have more opportunities. We thank and acknowledge our basketball community for responding with empathy to these changes, realising that we were all playing our part in keeping our community safe.

With the significant challenges brought about by COVID - 19, it is likely of no real surprise that our financial result for the 2021 was impacted, seeing a \$ 14.1 K deficit for the 2021 year. We anticipated that the year would be a challenging one financially with all of the uncertainty. We will continue to focus on financial resiliency over the coming year.

We gratefully acknowledge the support we have received from Funding Trusts and Sponsors. Without this support we would be unable to deliver the level of services and programmes that we do and continue to grow the game we all love.

TCBA could not function without significant support from our community. To that end, as an Executive, we would like to say a huge thank you to:

- Our loyal and fantastic volunteers that give freely of their time - TCBA could not do what we do without you.
- The dedicated referees of the Tauranga City Basketball Officials Association, who make it possible for us to run leagues and tournaments.



GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

2021 again a most challenging year for Tauranga City Basketball. The uncertainty the Covid Pandemic caused was felt by everyone in the world and TCBA was not immune to this. Our growth over the past decade had seen all resources used to cater for this increase. TCBA had very little in the way of reserves and the pandemic has shown we must be more aware of the need for building a cash reserve to ensure our organisation's sustainability. Numbers in our leagues in 2021 were heavily affected by venue restrictions and our community's concerns around Covid. Our representative and development programmes were also heavily impacted. We have continued to see the impact of the pandemic in 2022, however I believe we are far better placed to manage any further disruptions of this nature.



Venues

The Arena at Baypark is still in my opinion, the best multipurpose facility in New Zealand. Throughout 2021 we utilised this great venue for our local competitions, regional, and national events. The QEYC continues to be utilised heavily, and Memorial Hall in Whakatane is now a hub for basketball in the Eastern Bay. We are continuing to work with Bay Venues Limited and Councils to secure the space we need at venues, to grow our sport. It is of concern that there has been no growth in the number of courts available to us in the past eleven years and currently Tauranga City Council has no plans to increase court numbers until 2029. The expansion of our programmes and the demand from other codes and events for the indoor wooden courts sees our continued need to utilise other facilities, which have included many school gyms.

My thanks to all venues that have made space available for us. The cost of participation in our sport continues to be hugely impacted by venue costs. Basketball is at a disadvantage when compared to other team sports that are able to access Council facilities at a far cheaper level and therefore have a very different cost structure. We continue to work with council representatives to attempt to bring equality to council fee structures and to lobby for more indoor and outdoor basketball facilities. This need for increased facility space covers our entire region.

My thanks to the Bay Venues and Whakatane District Council staff who worked tirelessly to help ensure we could continue to operate under Covid restrictions.

Finance

2021 was another very uncertain year for us all financially. COVID - 19 restrictions and the unknown impact of the pandemic globally made for a very stressful year. Staffing levels had to increase to enable our community to continue to participate in a safe environment. We have continued to invest heavily in the growth and development of our sport and our members. 2021 sees us report a deficit of just over \$14,000.

Covid disruptions saw Tauranga City Basketball refund over \$50,000 to participants. This impacted on our end of year result.

We are hugely reliant on gaming charity funds and must thank the charities who have been extremely generous again in 2020. I would like to thank the Lion Foundation, the TAB and Grassroots Trust for their new funding support in 2021

I would also like to recognise the support of Sport New Zealand and the New Zealand Government who supported us through Tu Manawa funding. Without the support from these organisations Tauranga City Basketball would not be able to function at the level it does.

Our family of corporate partners were also impacted by the pandemic. We are extremely thankful to those that continue to support us. Tremains and Mark Francis continued as our Miniball league sponsors.

SAS Apparel joined our partners in 2014 and their support has continued to grow throughout 2021. Toi Ohomai continued their support of our programmes again in 2021. We had numerous local businesses support our rep and development programmes with donations of cash and product. This support has helped with fundraising activities for our players and in providing recognition for our numerous volunteers. My thanks to all those who have helped out over 2021. Thanks also to all those families and schools who donated refunds due to them from programmes affected by lockdowns and cancellations.

The pandemic has shown that going forward we need to build a financial reserve to safeguard the organisation and enable us to develop further.





Competitions and Tournaments

Our weekly competitions continue to be the core of our operations. Over 4000 people are involved on a weekly basis in the winter programmes.

Staff adapted to changing requirements throughout the year and changed and modified many of our programmes at short notice to ensure we provided the maximum safe level of basketball to our community all year.

During 2021 our programmes were heavily impacted by the Covid restrictions. Some BBNZ events and local tournaments also had to be cancelled or restructured. These tournaments are vital to help us retain talented players and also provide the opportunity for our elite players to compete in front of a home crowd.

Helen and all our other staff and many volunteers worked tirelessly to provide our local competitions under the restrictions in place. A huge effort was required to ensure we contact traced, kept under maximum venue numbers and completed all the extra cleaning required for our members to be able to play. My thanks to everyone who helped ensure we could provide the opportunity to play in a very uncertain time.



Walking Basketball

TCBA was the first association to introduce walking basketball into New Zealand. This programme has continued to grow over the past couple of years. My thanks to Jill Hill for her efforts in organising our group. It was great to attend the fifth anniversary of our programme commencing. Those involved are truly inspirational and show basketball is a sport for life.

Development

The continued work of our Director of Development and Development staff to cater for player development and our representative programme is helping us along our path of growth and improvement. The improvement we have had to date has increased the demand for quality coaching and playing opportunities. This in turn has created further pressures on staff time. Going forward we need to continue to cater for players wishing to continue to elite levels and resource this important part of our organisation.

Funding support from the Tu Manawa fund allowed us to continue the Girls Got Game programme, which aims to get more girls involved in basketball. Feedback was extremely positive and we hope to continue this programme in 2022.



Representative Programme

"Although 2021 created huge issues, it was another successful year for our representative programme. 26 teams participated in our programme which continues to grow is size and strength."



This result is due to the hard work of the Development staff, Coaches, Managers, players and supporters.

2021 saw six teams compete at BBNZ national events. The cancellation of BBNZ events limited the opportunities for our members to shine at this level. Our Coasters Women's team again had our most successful result, coming fourth in the NBL D league. Our U13 and Under teams missed out on a BBNZ Championship event (cancelled).

Basketball Pacific continued the Men's Representative League in 2021. This enabled us to field a men's representative side again, 2021 saw the team finish third. It is hoped a women's version will be available in 2022.

NBL 3x3

Basketball New Zealand launched a new National 3x3 competition in November 2020. We partnered with Rotorua BA to enter the Bay of Plenty Blaze team. Unfortunately, the competition had to be cancelled in 2021 due to the pandemic.



Referees

Our relationship with the Tauranga City Basketball Officials Association remains very strong. The work they do to train and allocate referees for our programmes often goes unrecognised. Without referees we have no games. Huge thanks to Jules, Jo and the rest of the team that ensure we are well served in this area.

Volunteers

Where would we be without our volunteers? The work done throughout our programmes by volunteers is immeasurable. Roles covered include coaching and managing representative teams, score bench, fundraising, ushering at competitions, cleaning and sanitising and working on our Executive Committee. Special thanks to our Life member Cliff Horne who spent many nights each week helping out to make sure our leagues could run. Our volunteers are too numerous to thank all personally. To all our volunteers a huge thank you for your time and effort.
